End the citation with the article page number. How to include interview content varies depending on the style guide you follow for your writing. When using the American Psychological Association (APA) style, your interview should be quoted as private communication or recorded in detail in your text. Apa interview writing format has specific rules on how to write interview papers. The APA format for the interview expects you to explain the clear purpose of your interview. You may not use interviews for information that can be obtained elsewhere, such as publications or online sources. Before your interview, you should be familiar with background literature and have clear and concise questions prepared. The published research did not include detailed or frank discussions about patient reporting bias in emergency medicine. Introduce the subject of your interview in text, describing his qualifications, background, and why he or she is suitable to answer your questions. Longer discussions about other biases should be set aside in block quotes. When quoting sources using the APA interview format, you should always include quotations in text in parentheses. Citations must be included immediately after a paraphrased quote or text, and include the first initials of the interviewee, last name, personal communication and the date the interview took place. My main method for correcting reporting bias is a carefully constructed questionnaire in lieu of free-form patient interviews. (J. Jones, private communications, April 9, 2018). If you mention an interviewee in a text that introduces a quotation or paraphrased text, their name doesn't need to be included in the citation in the text. Dr. Jones argues that questionnaires allow for greater honesty and accuracy in reporting (private communications, April 9, 2018). The APA interview format does not require references to interviews in your reference list because it is not a source that can be found by others. According to apa's official style guide, parentheses should surround the required content with no space between text and parentheses [like this]. Since many online video creators use online pseudonyms, you must include the author's screen name in parentheses when relevant. What if the author's screen name is spelled incorrectly? Online users often have all kinds of screen names, some that fit grammar and spelling rules and some that don't. When quoting a video on YouTube or another website, always type the creator's screen name exactly as it appears, including spelling and capitalization. What if the author's full name is not listed? Why is it so important to include a screen name? On YouTube and many other video websites, users must publish their content under a screen name. Sometimes users may create a screen name that is exactly the same as their real name, but in most cases, users create several types of names that represent the content they post or some other personal characteristics. In order for others to find a specific video, they may be able to search for the title of the video and find what they are looking for, but in most cases, people also need a screen name or username to find the right channel or video. Should video content be used as a reference? Whether the video is allowed as a source depends on the guidelines the instructor provides you. If you're not sure, ask. There are many reasons why you might want to quote a YouTube video in your writing. Videos may contain information that isn't available elsewhere, can show interviews with experts on a topic, or can present unique examples you want to refer to in your paper. What about including the name of the interview subject in reference? If the name of the interviewee is not mentioned in the video title, do not include it in the reference. Video podcasts are another type of video format you might want to quote at some point. Such podcasts often feature interviews with experts on a variety of topics, which can be a great unique source of information for your paper. As you can see in the example above, you should start by listing the authors, and then identify them as program hosts in parentheses. Next, include a date. After that, a list of episode titles, episode numbers in parentheses, and media types in parentheses. This should then be followed by the name of the video podcast, the name of the website it was taken from, and the URL. Note also in the example above that the title of the video podcast is in the form of italics. The official APA publication manual states that when written, video, or audio post is part of a thorough work (such as a blog or podcast series), the title of the total work should be included in italics. It follows the same format that you would use if you quote individual chapters that are part of the book. In addition to following specific rules for quoting and referencing electronic sources, there are a number of other BASIC APA rules that you should observe. Type and double space your paper on standard-sized paper. Your reference page should also be twice as far away. The first line of each reference should be flush-left, with each additional line of reference indented. Use the 12-point font, Times New Roman. Each page of paper must include a page number located in the upper right corner.
